COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course examines contemporary issues in the field of media studies, focuses on specialized topics in media theory and criticism. A significant emphasis will be placed on the role of media in shaping political discourse and public opinion. This course provides students with an in-depth understanding of the dynamic and evolving landscape of media, its impact on society, and the theoretical frameworks used to analyze it.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand specific theories and critical approaches used in analyzing media content, media effects, and media representations;
- 2. Explore and discuss contemporary issues and challenges faced by media in the digital age, understand the complex relationship between media, power, and society;
- 4. Develop skills in conducting media content analysis, apply the knowledge and theoretical frameworks to real-world case studies and research;
- 5. Gain insights into how media influences political communication, public attitudes, contributing to a well-rounded understanding of media's impact on society.
