## **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

This course is a survey of United States history from 1877 to the present. The major topics of the course will include the Industrial Revolution and the development of a modern economy, the rise of the United States to a position of global superpower, the evolution of civil rights issues in modern America, and the history of U.S. immigration policy.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify major events, developments, and themes of United States history from Reconstruction to the present;
- 2. Understand the nature of ethnicity, ethnic relations, and assimilation in recent American history;
- 3. Use historical ways of thinking about change and continuity to help explain important developments in the United States since 1877;
- 4. Write essays that synthesize primary and secondary sources related to modern U.S. history.
