COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course teaches the theories and practices of effective public speaking and helps students develop their public speaking skills. Topics covered in this course include speech preparation and delivery, audience analysis, persuasion techniques, and rhetorical choice. In addition, the course will also introduce the ethics of public speaking. In this course, students will have opportunities to practice speaking in front of an audience and receive feedback to analyse their speeches, as such help them improve their public speaking skills.

Upon Completion of this Course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the theory, practice, analysis, and ethics of public speaking, including the principles of effective communication and strategies for delivering successful presentations
- 2. Learn the importance of audience analysis and rhetorical choice, including how to identify the needs and interests of the audience, and tailor speeches accordingly
- 3. Explore the ethics of public speaking, including the importance of honesty, integrity, and accountability in speech preparation and delivery
- 4. Analyze speeches, including identifying strengths and weaknesses, and providing constructive feedback to peers
