COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course explores the intersection of gender and labor in contemporary society. Through an interdisciplinary approach, this course examines historical and contemporary issues surrounding women's participation in the workforce, including gender discrimination, wage gaps, work-life balance, and the impact of social, economic, and political factors on women's careers. Students will critically analyze theories, policies, and practices related to women and work, and explore strategies for promoting gender equality and empowerment in the workplace.

Upon Completion of this Course, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze the historical separation of work from home and its implications on gendered division of labor;
- 2. Evaluate various social arrangements facilitating women's participation in paid work and domestic responsibilities;
- 3. Assess the impact of class, race/ethnicity, and sexuality on women's choices and experiences in the workforce and at home;
- 4. Critically assess policies and practices aimed at promoting gender equity, work-life balance, and inclusive work environments;
- 5. Apply theoretical frameworks and empirical evidence to propose solutions for addressing gender disparities in the workplace and at home.
